
I'm happy that my cave is so nice and cosy, because these days, we actually have to stay at home most of the time. You see, there is a contagious virus that is

making a lot of people around the world very sick.








8. Wash and dry, wash and dry


We wanted to share this great song with all our friends. Amanda suggested that we go up on the roof of the cave. From there, we could sing the song so all the animals that live nearby could hear it.


It didn't take long before our neighbours peeked out and sang along. Their neighbours were also curious, and suddenly the whole forest seemed to be singing our hand-washing song.
